## Town Council Conducts September Session

The Kewanna town council met in regular session Thursday, Sept. 7, during which time Bob Murphy of R. P. Murphy and Associates conducted a public hearing concerning the town's proposal to apply for a grant to make improvements at the sewage treatment plant. Murphy provided estimates on doing the entire proposed project or performing only part of the necessary improvements. The council agreed it made more sense (and cents) to do the entire project even though it would require borrowing \$43,000 to make up the local match. The clerk was asked to look into securing the necessary funding.

A resolution was signed authorizing the submission of the grant application and committing the local match funds.

Marshal Dennis Price submitted his monthly report detailing three traffic arrests, seven traffic warnings, four criminal arrests, 38 calls answered and 1,771 miles patrolled. He also noted that new deputy, Chris Sailors, has started his duties and that he (Price) attended a state mandated class concerning mental health at Grissom in August.

Tony Pesaresi offered the fire department August report. The department responded to three town calls, all medical, and two township calls. The department's training activities included testing of all hoses. He also reported the department is still trying to locate a replacement for its rescue squad. The department will be giving various demonstrations on Saturday during the fall festival. The department's auxiliary group is planning to do something for Halloween trick or treaters.

A public hearing was conducted on the 2007 budget. There were no taxpayers present for the hearing. The budget will be adopted at a special meeting to be held at 5 p.m. Monday, Sept. 18, at the town hall.

The town superintendent, Mike Molitor, submitted his written monthly report. He reported that storm damage to a tree at the corner of Toner and Phillips required taking down the tree. Lids for the new catch basins on Phillips St. have been installed, completing the recent ground water tile project. The dirt is being leveled and stone added where needed. Packings on both pumps at the sewage treatment plant were replaced. Attempts were made to repair a sinkhole on Pearl Street, but the cause could not be determined. The superintendent consulted with Rex Urbin, Tom Mate and NIPSCO concerning additional electrical service for the town's upcoming fall festival. Two catch basin lids were repaired. The superintendent and his assistant attended a seminar at Grissom. Paperwork requested by R. P. Murphy and Associates for the

The unmatched speed and sub-millimeter detail of the new CT scanner will also contribute to more rapid assessment and decision making in trauma cases where physicians may have to make life and death decisions within minutes.

Patients needing a CT scan will find that Woodlawn Hospital's new scanner offers a much more pleasant experience. Having your heart and coronary arteries evaluated using a CT scanner reduces the need for drugs to regulate the rhythm of the heart. And there is no hospital stay required. With much faster scan times patients will usually be asked to carry out one brief breath hold during each scan.

"Older patients and those with breathing difficulties or some other distress will really appreciate the shorter exam," says Alley. "We'll have them in and out much faster, and their doctors will be able to access detailed, definitive results within minutes."

All CT scanners use X-rays, however, the new Brilliance scanner uses a significantly lower amount of X-ray energy than many of the other CT systems on the market.

"While we need the critical anatomical information we get from a CT scan, we always want to limit the X-ray dose to the patient to the absolute minimum possible, especially for children," says Alley. "Our new Brilliance scanner features unique technology that ensures we get exceptional images with

significantly lower dose to the patient. And, it has specific built-in pediatric protocols that further minimize the dose to children," he says.

Another advantage the hospital anticipates is the ability to provide more large patients with a CT scan option. The new Brilliance scanner has a table weight capacity of up to 440 pounds.

A CT scan produces a cross-sectional image of the human anatomy, which helps the clinician to rule out or confirm the presence of certain disease, and in some cases to evaluate the extent of injuries to a trauma patient, such as someone involved in an automobile accident. During the non-invasive test, the patient is placed on a table and moved incrementally through the squared off donut-shaped scanner while an X-ray beam is projected through cross sections of their anatomy. The X-ray energy passes through the patient and is recorded on electronic detectors in the scanner. This information is then sent to a specialized computer that reconstructs the information into individual slices and combines them sequentially into a comprehensive volume image of the entire area scanned. The thinner the slices, the more revealing the detail is in the resulting image and the more definitive the exam results.


## Military Uniforms Sought

**A Primer on Pet Allergies**



They can also increase opportunities for socialization and exercise, decrease blood pressure and cholesterol and triglyceride levels and increase longevity after heart attacks.

Still, if you've just been diagnosed with an animal allergy, you may be wondering if you can really keep your beloved pet. Surprisingly, the answer is a possible yes – if you take steps to prevent and treat your exposure.

**First**, reduce dander levels in your home by:

- making some rooms, like bedrooms, pet-free zones
- using room-sized or home-wide HEPA filters
- washing your bedding frequently in hot water
- bathing your pet weekly
- using micro filters on your vacuum cleaner; also consider replacing dander-trapping carpet


**Oh baby ... I've got the blues**

**Going Above and Beyond the Call**

I am writing this article in order to recognize school bus driver, Mr. Jerry Baker. Mr. Baker stopped in to discuss the possibility of providing training for all of our kindergarten students on how to properly approach the bus when boarding and how to leave the bus when arriving back home and at school. I thought this was a great idea. He asked me if I would participate in the training and I said, "Sure thing." Wednesday, September 6, 2006, Mr. Baker began his day as usual with picking up his morning group of students. Following this morning run he drove his bus to the normal pick up point for after school and parked his bus in the drive. He then proceeded to place yellow caution tape out in front of the bus so the students would know where to walk when practicing. He also placed a yellow caution tape extended from the door out so students would know they are not to go behind the bus when entering or leaving. Once he had his "props" in place he proceeded to the kindergarten room to provide some safety comments to the students prior to bringing them out to the bus to practice.

When he and the students arrived he again provided the direction for the drill and then introduced me as the driver and

made certain each student knew they were to look at the driver as they approached the bus as well as looking both ways down the road. He then worked with each child individually to make sure they remained out of the danger area and in the safe area previously marked out and also reminded them to watch the driver as they proceeded across in front of the bus. When all students were on the bus, Mr. Baker came on board and complimented the students on doing a fine job. The next step was to show the students the proper means of leaving the bus safely. We allowed the students to leave the bus by twos. He again worked with each group to make sure they moved only in the safety area and maintained eye contact with the driver. When the entire group was back up on the sidewalk, he again complimented them for a job well done.

Mr. Jerry Baker is to be commended for his efforts to help teach our Young Comets the proper procedures for getting on and off a bus. His efforts are certainly appreciated and he deserves your "pat on the back" for GOING ABOVE AND BEYOND THE CALL OF DUTY!



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### 31<sup>st</sup> Trail of Courage Sept. 16-17

The 31st annual Trail of Courage Living History Festival will be held Sept. 16-17. Hours are 10 a.m.-6 p.m. Sat., Sept. 16, and 10 a.m.-4 p.m., Sun., Sept. 17. Frontier Indiana comes alive with music and dance on two stages, Indian dances, pre-1840 crafts and trading, foods cooked over wood fires, contests, buffalo, goats and horses, muzzleloader shoots, cannon demo, and canoe rides on Tippecanoe River. The event will be held on the Fulton County Historical Society grounds on US 31 north of Rochester. Admission is \$6 for adults, \$2 children for 6 to 11, and free for children age 5 and under. Each year a different Potawatomi family who had ancestors on the 1838 Trail of Death is honored. This year it is the Chief Keesis family, members of the Prairie Band Potawatomi Nation, of Mayetta, Kansas.

A commemorative postal folder and cancellation at the Chippeway Village post office at the Trail of Courage will tell the history of Chief Keesis in Indiana and his family in Kansas. Keesis is the Potawatomi word for "sun." The cancellation will be available on a commemorative folder that sells for \$1. The cancellation is free on postcards that can be purchased at the Chippeway Village post office. It is also available free on any other pieces of mail that anyone wishes to mail during the festival.

This is a real post office, built in 1989 from old barn boards, and visitors can actually mail letters and postcards there. Special post cards will be for sale that show local history, such as Chief Aubeenaubbee, Chief Kewanna, Chief White Eagle, Round Barn Museum, etc.

The Chippeway post office is manned by postal employees who volunteer their time. Marvin

Gilliland, Kewanna post master, is in charge. They have been operating the frontier post office and offering Trail of Courage commemorative folders since 1996.

New programs at the Trail of Courage this year will include Johnny Appleseed, portrayed by Steve McPhail, Upland, Ind. There were trees planted in Fulton County by Johnny Appleseed. Hannah Jones, Akron, will play violin. Hoosier Ladies Aside will bring horses and demonstrate riding side saddle. The Metis Band, led by new chief Tim Jordan, Hamlet, will set up two wigwams on the west side and demonstrate Woodland Indian lifeways. The honored Potawatomi family will be descendants of Chief Keesis, who signed treaties and annuity payments in north central Indiana and went to Kansas on the Trail of Death in 1838. Keesis family members are coming from Kansas, Colorado, Nevada, and Florida. They will tell their history at 10:30 a.m. on the Chippeway Village stage both days. ## Ovarian Cancer: The Silent Disease

Each year in the United States, more women die of ovarian cancer than of cervical and endometrial cancers combined, according to the National Cancer Institute.....

Just another ho-hum statement that will zip right by your thought process until it happens to you or someone you love! Then ovarian cancer is the center of your world!

Unfortunately, while Pap tests have become a routine method for detecting cervical cancer early, an equivalent screening test for ovarian cancer is not yet available.

### Symptoms

Many women with ovarian cancer do not possess any symptoms, often described as nonexistent or nondescript. A recent study of women with ovarian cancer indicated that they may experience bloating or feelings of fullness, abdominal or back pain, lack of energy, frequent urination, constipation or diarrhea, and even shortness of breath.

### Risk factors

The gene mutations BRCA1 and BRCA2, commonly associated with breast cancer, are also responsible for some incidences

of ovarian cancer. Women who possess these mutations, in fact, have a 17 to 44% chance of developing ovarian cancer at some point in their lifetimes, according to the American Cancer Society.

Additionally, gene mutations related to nonpolyposis colon cancer cause about one percent of ovarian epithelial cancers.

### Other risk factors include:

- A family history of ovarian cancer (mother, sister, grandmother)
- Early onset of

menstruation (before age 12)

- Late childbearing (first child after age 30)
- Prolonged use of the fertility drug clomiphene citrate
- Breast cancer
- The use of estrogen replacement therapy

Not all researchers agree on each of these risk factors, and of course, no risk factor guarantees you'll develop ovarian cancer.

### Testing

If you're experiencing symptoms of ovarian cancer or your health care provider is concerned about your risk, he/she may order some of the following tests after a thorough pelvic and physical exam:

- CT scans: A series of X-rays assembled by a computer, CT scans (also called CAT scans or computerized tomography) display different body angles, uncovering abnormalities. This is probably the best method of evaluate the possibility of ovarian cancer in the appropriate populations.
- Vaginal and abdominal ultrasound: This procedure bounces sound waves off the ovaries, uncovering fluid-filled cysts, tumors or masses.
- CA-125 assay: This blood test measures the level of CA-125, a tumor marker sometimes (but not always) produced by ovarian cancer cells. While its accuracy to screen for ovarian cancer is questionable, it is best used to follow disease progression and response to therapy.

Talk with your physician if you're concerned about risk factors or symptoms of ovarian cancer. Early detection and treatment improves chances for recovery.


