The Kewanna Fall Festival will open at 2 p.m. Friday, Sept. 29, with carnival rides, games, food vendors, arts, crafts, flea market items, paint ball, a climbing wall, obstacle course, dime roll, plinko board and more. The various booths will close at 10 a.m. Saturday hours will be 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. and Sunday booth hours will be 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Lavern Yoder will offer horse drawn buggy rides from 3 to 8 p.m. Friday and 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Saturday.

Lynn's Restaurant will serve a fish fry beginning at 4 p.m. Friday; a biscuit and gravy breakfast from 6 to 11 a.m. Saturday; and pizza by the slice from 5 to 10 p.m. Saturday.



County Officials Attend Conference

Several Fulton County officials were among the 400 county officials and county employees who attended the Association of Indiana Counties' (AIC) 48th annual conference held September 18-21 in South Bend.

The county officials attending included Denise Chandler, auditor; Judy Reed, treasurer; Lorie Hurst, deputy treasurer; and Carol Loebig, Rochester

Township assessor.

The conference, the largest gathering of county officials in the state, included meetings designed specifically for each elected county official, 13 different workshops as well as informal opportunities where county officials and employees discussed issues with their colleagues from other areas of the state. Officials met at the Century Center to discuss and offer solutions for issues facing local governments. Representatives from public agencies, private entities, universities and local elected officials addressed such issues as tax law changes, strategic community planning, eminent domain limitations, judicial mandates, criminal justice funding, etc.





Indiana Will Enforce Autodialer Law

Indiana Attorney General Steve Carter made it clear last week that enforcing Indiana's autodialer law is important for protecting the residential privacy rights of Hoosiers. Carter made this

announcement on the heels of learning that legal action has been filed against him for enforcing the state statute against companies for making illegal, pre-recorded calls to citizens.

In a press release issued Thursday, September 21, FreeEats.com, Inc. indicated that it has filed a lawsuit in federal court to halt the attorney general from enforcing a law that would give Hoosiers the ability to choose if they wished to receive a pre-recorded message.

The state is in the process of reviewing that filing, which was recently received. The lawsuit was filed in the Southern District of Indiana, Indianapolis.

Seven companies have entered court-filed agreements this year with the attorney general's office to comply with federal and state automated dialing statutes in 2006.




