## Trick or Treat Night Set

The Kewanna town council set trick or treat night for Tuesday, October 31, from 6 to 7:30 p.m. when it met for its October session last Thursday. Residents who welcome the trick or treaters are asked to keep an outside light burning during the trick or treat hours. Parents should caution their children to stop at those houses only.

Casi Cramer, plan director for the Area Plan Commission, presented zoning ordinances pertaining to Kewanna for council members to review. She also distributed the portion of the zoning regulations that will pertain to the whole county in general. These basically concern organization and administration.

Town marshal, Dennis Price, reported he will conduct his annual Halloween Safety Night Tuesday, October 24, at the fire station. His monthly report revealed 12 traffic warnings, two criminal arrests, 44 calls answered, one vehicle check and 1,251 miles patrolled.

The council considered a quote/proposal for replacing the "little town with a big heart" signs. The council agreed to seek other quotes and designs.

Ranger Material was awarded repaving work on South Smith Street.

The council voted to transfer \$20,000 from the CCI Cigarette Tax Fund to the General Fund to apply to the purchase of a rescue squad for the fire department. The clerk was instructed to advertise additional appropriations for the expenditure.

A recommendation from the town superintendent to purchase a used bucket truck at a cost of \$3,700 was okayed by the council.

The council proposed water and sewage rate increases. A public hearing date will be set at the next meeting of the council.

The fire department's monthly report noted four town runs (one fire, three medical) one township run, two investigations and one mutual aid. Training pertained to use of S.C.B.As with Wayne Township. Departmental personnel logged a total of 289½ man-hours for the month.

The town superintendent reported that annual water samples had been pulled and taken to South Bend. An inventory of the lab equipment at the sewage treatment plant and a review of required testing were done to determine if some of the testing could be done in house.

The superintendent and his assistant attended a seminar in Plymouth on the Stage 2 Disinfection By-product Rule. The town will have to comply with this rule beginning in 2008 but may be qualified for a waiver for some of the testing. The starter was replaced on the dump truck. The water works pumped a total of 1,315,500 gallons of water during September.



### Festival of Flight, October 14

From WWII heroes to hands-on fun, virtually anything to do with flying can be found at Grissom Air Museum's Fifth Annual Festival of Flight. This unique family festival is packed with aviation related exhibits, hands-on activities, flying demonstrations, tours, veteran presentations, re-enactors, music and food. Military units from the Grissom Air Reserve Base and Indiana National Guard will also have displays and hands-on activities. The Festival runs 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. on October 14, 2007.

Heroic WWII-era Americans such as "Rosie the Riveter" Dorothy Kawaguchi, Tuskegee Airmen Julius Jackson, pioneering female aviator Verona Harvey and Melvin Biddle a

Congressional Medal of Honor recipient will share their fascinating stories and sign autographs. There will also be WWII re-enactors, and a large display of home front memorabilia.

Kawaguchi was a factory worker during WWII popularly known as "Rosie the Riveter". She repaired battle-damaged aircraft and packed aircrew survival kits often sneaking in extra rations. Tuskegee Airmen Julius Jackson served with the famous all-black flying unit which earned great distinction in the skies over Europe. Verona Harvey was a pilot and flight instructor before and during WWII, a position few women held during that era. In the course of their honorable service, Kawaguchi, Jackson and Harvey took on social barriers, and paved the way for the rights movements which followed.

Melvin Biddle of Anderson is the only surviving Congressional Medal of Honor recipient living in Indiana. Biddle was awarded the Medal of Honor for incredible valor in defense of our nation during The Battle of the Bulge. During World War II only 463 of the 17 million men and women who served were recipients and more than half of them lost their lives during their acts of heroism.

Flying activities at the Festival will range from classic warbirds to high-tech radio control

helicopters. Bergen RC will put on exciting radio control demonstrations throughout the day. There will also be model rocket launches, plus giant kites flown by the Hoosier Kite Flyers Society.

The Festival features a host of fun-filled activities for kids of all ages. They can build and fly their own kites and gliders. They can "shoot the sun" through a navigator's sextant, and drop "bombs" on targets from a remote control plane. They can also sit in cockpits, ride vintage pedal planes, tackle an inflatable obstacle course, explore a giant inflatable spaceship, try out a Wright brothers' plane simulator and even fire a corn cannon.

Visitors can take special tours among the museum's 24 historic aircraft, where they can speak with numerous veterans who flew those planes. There will be a host of other displays and activities including tours inside the YS-11, statewide student aviation art contest, ham radio operators and aviation souvenirs.

Toe-tapping music will be provided by the Peru Circus Festival Band. And of course there will be great food!

This year, there will also be activities and displays from the Grissom Air Reserve Base by the 434th Air Refueling Wing, plus Army, Navy and Marine Reserve units. A shuttle will run to the base where people can see an Air National Guard F-16 Falcon on display and tour inside a KC-135 Stratotanker.

Admission is \$4 for adults; \$3 for veterans, seniors and students; and kids 6 and under are free. No admission will be charged at Grissom Air Reserve Base. Some events are weather permitting.

## HEATING BILLS PROJECTED TO DECLINE THIS WINTER

Natural Gas Prices Moderate on Wholesale Market

**MERRILLVILLE, Ind.** - If the Midwest sees normal temperatures this winter, home heating bills could decrease by as much as 30 percent, Northern Indiana Public Service Company (NIPSCO) announced today.

The decrease can be attributed to a number of factors. The price of natural gas on the wholesale market has fallen precipitously due to last winter's warmer-than-normal temperatures and this year's quiet hurricane season in the Gulf of Mexico, where much of the nation's natural gas is

produced.

"This is good news for our customers that we're happy to deliver," said NIPSCO President Mark Maassel. "Even though prices have moderated, it's important for our customers to keep in mind that the wholesale natural gas market is still volatile and prices, as well as bills, could increase if the Midwest experiences a colder-than-normal winter."

Last winter was one of the warmest on record and the average heating bill for a NIPSCO customer last January was \$187. If temperatures are normal in the Midwest this winter, the cost to heat a home this January could be approximately \$115. If temperatures are colder than last winter, the cost to heat a home most likely will be higher as customers will be consuming more gas. Over the entire winter heating season - Nov. 1 to March 31 - the average residential customer could pay approximately \$600 to heat their home, which represents a 30 percent decrease when compared to the same period last winter.

"We have access to a safe, secure and reliable supply of natural gas to meet customer demand and the cost to deliver the gas to our customers has been flat since 1991," said Maassel. "Our focus right now is providing customers with the tools and resources to stay warm and be safe in their homes this winter heating season."


