**THE LAKE BRUCE  
 CONSERVANCY  
 DISTRICT  
 NEWS**

The Lake Bruce Conservancy District held its monthly meeting Thursday, October 12, in the community room of the Kewanna-Union Township Fire Station. Three directors and 22 freeholders were present.

The minutes of the August meeting and the treasurer's report were approved.

Chairman Norman Steigely covered correspondence received by the conservancy during the month. An email was received from Gwen White, Department of Natural Resources (DNR) biologist, about funding for 2007 and setting up a fall meeting to discuss a course of action. The district has already been in contact with Weed Patrol and has tentatively set a meeting for November 27, but the date will have to be confirmed by the DNR. Since the DNR has not made the decision yet on what method they will require for surveys in 2007, J.F. New has presented a bid for \$12,500 if they continue with the 17-step process. If the DNR goes back to the simple system, it would be \$4,000 to \$6,000. Weed Patrol is getting with V3 to give the district a price on surveys for 2007 this week.

**Weed Control.** Weeds along the channel near South Park Road were treated last week. No treatment for milfoil was needed this fall.

Because the Hydrilla in Lake Manitou problem continues to escalate, the conservancy board has been in touch with Bo's Marine about making sure that the boat trailers are cleaned properly so we don't get Hydrilla at Lake Bruce. Separate trailers are being used for each lake to eliminate the possibility of them spreading the problem.

Director Gerald Porter will be attending a seminar and meeting October 21 that will deal with problems facing lakes in Northern Indiana.

**Dredging Project.** The district has received another permit from the DNR for vegetation control related to the dredging project. The project has not started and will not until Mother Nature cooperates and the landowner is able to harvest his crop on the site to be used as the holding area. The district received a letter from J.F. New about discharge from the holding area to the ditch. The district is concerned about saturating the area that will be used for the sewage treatment plant site and suggested that a tile may be needed to eliminate the potential problem. It was also announced that anyone who has property that falls in the area to be dredged will need to get their boats and piers out if they want the work done. If anyone on the

west side of the lake wants their area dredged but is not in the planned area, they can contract with Tennant's Dredging on their own, but they must have a dredging permit from the DNR.

**Sewer Project.** Steve Fralish of Wightman-Petrie gave a report on the progress of the sewer project. He said design efforts were proceeding well on the revisions caused by the need for two vacuum stations instead of one. Sites have been selected and negotiations are ongoing with the landowners. All soil borings and the BSU archeological study have been completed and no artifacts were found. The wetland delineation has also been completed.

Wightman-Petrie is still working on the revisions to the preliminary engineering report and the engineering report due to the two vacuum stations design change.

Fralish also brought drawings showing the preliminary location of vacuum pits for the sewer project. He noted he would go through these maps with any interested party after the meeting. Many in attendance stayed to view the drawings and give their input. These documents will be on file at the Kewanna-Union Township Public Library for viewing by interested parties.

A special viewing of this document will be held at the Hoosier Hide-a-way Saturday, November 11, from 11 a.m. to 3 p.m. Engineers from both Wightman-Petrie and Airvac will be on hand to explain the details, listen to concerns and make necessary changes. All interested parties are urged to attend.

The next scheduled conservancy district meeting will be Thursday, November 9, at 7 p.m. in the fire station community room.

Dear Editor:

At the end of our General Election ballot in Fulton County for 2006 will be questions whether to retain Supreme Court Justice Frank Sullivan, Jr. in office and whether to retain Appellate Court Judges Terry A. Crone and Patricia A. Riley in office. Beginning in 1972 with an amendment to the State Constitution, we have voted seventeen times as to the retention of Judges in office. Instead of holding partisan elections for Supreme and Appellate Court Judges, we have a merit system where the Judicial Nominating Commission interviews potential candidates for office with the Governor (after a series of interviews) then appointing one of the three individuals that the Nominating Commission selects. The Judge in office then serves a minimum of two years, standing for retention vote on that occasion and every ten years thereafter.

In Fulton County, we vote for all of the Justices of Supreme Court, for those Appellate Court Judges that come from Northern Indiana District (the Third District) and for Appellate Court Judges that come from the at-large Districts (District Four and Five). The Indiana State Bar Association conducts a poll of its members in the fall to create a recommendation as to whether a justice or judge should be retained in office and this year nearly 1500 members of the state bar voted. I provide the following information for your consideration in deciding how to vote in 2006.

Justice Frank Sullivan has been on Indiana's highest Court, the Supreme Court, since November 1, 1993. He is a native of South Bend, Indiana, a graduate of St. Joseph High School, Dartmouth College in 1972, and the Indiana University School of Law at Bloomington in 1982. He is married to Cheryl Sullivan who has also filled a variety of state government positions and they are the parents of three children, all boys. He is an avid runner and has qualified and run in the Boston Marathon. Prior to his appointment to the Supreme Court, he practiced law in the Indianapolis offices of Barnes and Thornburg and served then Governor Evan Bayh as the State Budget Director from 1989 to 1992. Since his appointment to the Supreme Court, he has authored nearly 400 majority opinions for the Court. In his administrative work for the Court, he has chaired the Judicial Technology and Automation Committee, working to establish a statewide computer system for Indiana's Courts. He has remained active on many committees throughout the legal community and is the 2002 recipient of the Indiana State Bar Association's Emison Award for significant contribution in advancing opportunities for minority lawyers. He is recommended for retention by a vote of the Indiana State Bar Association 81% voting yes, 15% voting no, and 4% abstaining.

Judge Terry Crone, presently serving as Presiding Judge of the Third District, was appointed to the Indiana Court of Appeals on March 8, 2004 by Governor Kernan and remains the newest member of the Court of Appeals. Crone is a 1974 graduate of DePauw University and Notre Dame Law School, practicing law in St. Joseph County for nearly a decade including five years as the County Attorney for St. Joseph County. He served as Magistrate to the St. Joseph Circuit Court and then Judge of the St. Joseph Circuit Court for nearly 15 years before his appointment to the Indiana Court of Appeals. Crone filled numerous judicial committee positions during his years as a trial court judge and, as an appellate court judge, has been a frequent speaker at legal education programs and is now the moderator of the Indianapolis Bar Association Leader Series. He is married and has three children, all girls. He is recommended for return by a vote of the Indiana State Bar Association 70% voting yes, 14% voting no, and 15% abstaining.

Judge Patricia A. Riley, 57, was appointed to the Fourth District Court of Appeals by Governor Bayh in 1994 after 20 years as a lawyer and trial court judge at Rensselaer. She graduated from Indiana University and the IU School of Law at Indianapolis before entering private practice. She worked as a Prosecuting Attorney in Marion County after graduation from law school before returning to Jasper County. While practicing law, she served as Professor at St. Joseph College and was Chairman of the State Joint Committee of the Bench and Bar concerning gender issues. Since being appointed to the Court of Appeals, she has

served on the Board of Directors of the National Association of Women Judges and on the International Committee of the American Bar Association. She teaches trial practice on Saturday morning as an adjunct professor at the IU School of Law in Indianapolis. Judge Riley has two adult sons. She is recommended for return by a vote of the Indiana State Bar Association 70% voting yes, 21% voting no and 9% abstaining.

I hope this information gives you some background to consider for your yes/no vote on Election Day.






