## Fulton County Receives \$537,815 In Additional Funding For Local Units Of Government

INDIANAPOLIS (October 13, 2006) – For the first time in five years, local units of government across the state today received direct state support for their bridge and road projects. The first of two \$75 million motor vehicle highway fund (MVH) distributions to all 92 counties through Governor Mitch Daniels' Major Moves initiative was completed today.

"The huge transportation shortfall Major Moves addressed was not state government's problem alone. From my travels to cities and towns across the state, I've seen firsthand the need to help local governments address their own infrastructure needs," said Daniels. "Companies looking to locate in Indiana don't care whether the roads they would use bear a federal, state or local designation. First class transportation infrastructure at all levels is vital to our future economic comeback."

The governor proposed the MVH distribution when he announced the Major Moves program in January. Counties, cities and towns had not received such funding for local projects for the past five years. The funds are being distributed based on the current motor vehicle highway fund formula. The state transferred the first \$75 million to local governments today via electronic transfer. The second \$75 million will be distributed next year.

These funds are on top of the more than \$10 billion the state will spend on new construction, major preservation, and resurfacing projects across the state over the next 10 years.

The share of the funds that local units of government in Fulton County received is \$537,814.67.

Here's how the Fulton County funds will be distributed by the county auditor:

- \$479,977.91, Fulton County
- \$7,382.25, Akron
- \$2,236.63, Fulton
- \$4,212.55, Kewanna
- \$44,005.33, Rochester

The counties and cities can use the MVH funds as prescribed by IC 8-14-1-3, which includes construction, reconstruction, and maintenance of highways, roads and bridges and the purchase or lease of highway equipment, among other things.

In June, the state received \$3.8 billion for a 75-year lease to the Indiana Toll Road Concession Company to manage and operate the road. Since July 5, when the State Treasurer invested the money, the state has earned more than \$52.5 million in interest at an average rate of 5.46 percent.

## No Child Should Go Hungry in a Farm Community

Keller Advisory Group located in Winamac and Red Hen Turf Farms at New Carlisle recently sent out letters to area farmers encouraging them to take part in a program in which they are able to give back to their communities by donating grain to benefit local food pantries.

The farmer can donate a load of grain for which the elevator will send a check to the farmer's food pantry of choice. With as little as 200 bushels of corn or 50 bushels of soybeans, hopefully turned into \$400, the food pantry can purchase about 15,000 pounds of food worth \$22,500, retail.

Keller Advisory Group and Red Hen Turf Farms want people to know that any little bit helps those in need. They ask area farmers to pass on some of the good fortune they have.

Keller Advisory Group has volunteered to be an information source on grain buyers offering premium prices and food bank groups and addresses to receive the donation. Contact them at 574-946-6173.

Farmers who would like to donate grain should select the food bank they wish to support. Talk to their grain buyer and convince them to participate by giving them a higher than normal price for the grain and give them the address of where to send the check.

When you deliver the grain, show the name of the organization you are donating to as the "seller" of the grain. Keep a copy of the ticket. The farmer still retains production evidence with FSA if they have filled out the 633EZ before harvest. FSA only cares who produces the grain, not who gets the money from it. If you deem it necessary, you can send a copy of the distribution form to your FSA office as production evidence. You cannot claim the value of the grain as a donation on your taxes, but you do not claim it as income either.

Key Waste picked up a total of 2,682 pounds of recyclables from Kewanna curb sides during the month of September.

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
## Improvement Committee Selling Pies

haven't heard about your results within 10 days, call your doctor.



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

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### Caring for the Caregiver

Today, as couples bear children at later ages and life expectancy increases, more and more women find themselves caring for an elderly relative while also trying to raise their own children.

It's important to remember, however, that not taking time for your physical and emotional well-being will eventually affect your ability to care for your family.

Pulaski Memorial Home Health and Hospice offers these ideas to help maintain your optimum health in spite of your exhausting duties:

- **Ask for help.** Family members are obvious choices to assist, but if they're not available or are already helping, a local organization may be able to provide some respite care or other services.
- **Stay active.** Taking a walk, digging in your garden or swimming laps in a pool will not only help maintain your physical health, but will also help clear your mind of your worries.

- **Keep a journal.** A loved one's last years or days can be saddening, frustrating and even frightening. They can also be humorous or joyful. Jotting down your thoughts gives you a healthy outlet for any negative emotions. The record could also comfort you after your loved one is gone.

- **Find an empathetic ear.** A dear friend or the grief support group at PMH can help you sort out your feelings and clarify your own needs.

- **Get plenty of sleep.** It's tempting to go to bed late or get up early to allow yourself more time in the day. But sleep deprivation could also make you less productive and more irritable, and could lead to illness down the road.

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### Deer Season Presents Challenges

Each year, car collisions with deer account for more than 150 human and nearly one and a half million deer fatalities. October through December is the high season for crashes, since it is a time for both wandering deer and shortened daylight hours.

Most collisions with a deer occur during this time of year when deer are mating and migrating. An adult deer can weigh more than 200 pounds and a car striking one can not only result in the death of the deer, but also incur, on average, two thousand dollars in damage to the vehicle. Here are a few basic cautions for drivers:

- Scan a wide swath of the roadside. Slow down when approaching a deer standing near the side of a road and be prepared. If startled, the deer can bolt onto the roadway and into your path. If necessary, honk your horn and flash your lights to try to

scare it away.

- Be alert for more deer than you may see at that moment. Where there is one deer, there are often more nearby.
- In many instances, it is best not to swerve around the deer since the deer may move in the same direction. You may also inadvertently hit another vehicle, or go off onto a dangerous shoulder. Unless certain of those road factors, it is often best to simply brake and continue in your lane of traffic.
- Be particularly careful at dawn and dusk and when driving either over a hill or around a curve, where visibility is limited. Use your high beams to give you a greater area of visibility and allow you to see the deer's eyes sooner.
- Deer whistles or ultrasonic deer avoidance systems attached to vehicles have never been proven to work by independent studies and may give drivers a false sense of security.
- Take deer crossing signs seriously, particularly those installed specifically for this time of year. Be particularly cautious in wooded and agricultural areas where there is little distance between the road and the woods.
